Antisemitism: Anatomy of a Hatred.

This course considers one of the oldest and most persistent forms of hatred. What is antisemitism? How is it part of the family of bigotries, prejudice and discrimination, and how is it unique? Is it more bigotry or ideology? How has it manifested itself in different eras, regions, political and economic systems and culture? How is it defined? What different types are there? Is anti-Zionism antisemitism? Why does it exist in some countries that do not even have Jews? How can it be combated?

This is a course designed for upper-level students, but a motivated and interested first or second year student should be capable of doing well. At the end of the course, students should be able to identify and differentiate different types of antisemitism, understand how antisemitism works (and changes) as an ideology, how historical and socio-economic factors do and do not impact it, and how it fits within (but is also different from other members of) the family of bigotries.

The subject is broken down into twenty-eight discrete units, which will be taught over fourteen weeks (each class will cover two units). In addition to the assigned readings, other relevant books and materials (including antisemitic ones) are noted in the “additional resources” section, either for the student who is particularly interested in a sub-topic, or as possible resources for either of the two papers assigned. Only the assigned readings are expected to be read – the others are merely suggestions for students who want to delve more deeply into a topic, or see more points of view about an issue. Many of the materials will be available from the web, others are accessible through links on the JKRFUNDATION.ORG or at the library. If you have any problems accessing material, email me right away and I’ll send it to you. Additionally, the Justus & Karin Rosenberg Foundation has established a resource room on antisemitism and hatred, located in Aspinwall 201. Materials are listed and described [here](#). ASSIGNMENTS: There will be a mid-semester paper of ten pages (one-page synopsis due by session 8, paper due session 15), a group survey project done during the second half of the semester (design discussed session 18, due session 22, results discussed session 23), and a final 15-page paper (one page description due by session 15, paper due session 26). (A page means 250 words.)

After the first class, a student will be designated to help lead the discussion in each upcoming session. Students should not summarize the content; they should articulate at least 4 questions that the material raises.

ADDITIONALLY (OPTIONAL, BUT STRONGLY ENCOURAGED - EXTRA CREDIT AVAILABLE)

1) Harvard professor Derek Penslar will be speaking twice on campus on **Monday September 12** - he will be discussing Theodor Herzl (who we will read later in the semester) at a lunch talk (Dr. Penslar is writing a biography of Herzl), and at 4:30 he will address the state of scholarship around Israel and Palestine. We will also reading some of Dr. Penslar's work this semester. He is one of the world's leading historians about Israel.

2) I also encourage you to attend the 3:15 pm and 3:45 sessions of the Hannah Arendt Center's annual conference, on **Friday October 21**. You can register here: <http://hac.bard.edu/con2016>. The conference is on difficult questions, and the sessions that day with Ken Marcus (whose writings we will read) and Dima Khalidi will be directly relevant to our class (particularly about anti-Zionism and antisemitism, antisemitism on campus, and how we define, measure, and combat antisemitism). The Hannah Arendt Center is also sponsoring an essay contest (see contest tab on the above link) and has shared some suggested readings - I'll pass those out to you well in advance, in case you are interested.

If you write an acceptable one-page paper about the Herzl talk, the Israel/Palestine scholarship talk, and/or the Marcus/Khalidi sessions (you should write about both Marcus and Khalidi, rather than one or the other), you will receive an extra 1.5 points for each. The paper should address what you learned from the talk that surprised you the most, or new questions it raised about antisemitism or hatred, or how it made you think differently about any of the readings in the course. You may submit the one-page paper

any time before December 5 (you may want to write it while the talk is fresh, or wait until we read related class materials).

GRADING: 40 percent final paper, 40 percent class participation (including work on group survey), 20 percent midterm paper.

I encourage you to read other parts of the book too, since it is a good general survey but there is only limited time to cover some eras, trends, ideologies and incidents.

Session 10: The first half of this session will be devoted to discussion of topics students have chosen for their first paper (10 pages), due by Session 15. By this time each student should have selected a topic examining an issue of antisemitism covered through session 9 in more detail, and had a one-page description approved.

After 9 sessions on hatred of Jews and genocide toward them, this is the first discussion (others later and in more depth in the course) about what might be effective in countering the various different types of antisemitism, and why. We will focus today on *Nostrae Aetate* – a success story in combating antisemitism. How and why did it come about? Are the lessons from this sea change in Catholic teaching about Jews that might, or would not, be applicable in other areas?

Constructing a Campus Survey. Each student needs to bring in at least five model survey questions that might be used for a campus-wide survey on antisemitic attitudes. Proposed survey questions will be discussed, and a model survey instrument decided upon. Students will also be responsible for planning how to conduct the survey (survey monkey?), whether the survey will be of only students, or also faculty and staff, how to spread word about the survey (email lists? Student newspaper? Facebook? Text messages?) and will need to decide timetable and teams responsible for different tasks – preparation, dissemination, collection, analysis. Results of survey must be ready to be distributed for Session 23.

Session 26 – papers due. Discussion of how antisemitism is like, and unlike, other forms of bigotry and discrimination. Each student will be expected to present a short review of what bigotry they selected, what they read about that form of bigotry, how antisemitism was similar to, and different from, that form of bigotry, and what those differences and similarities say about antisemitism.

Session 27 – discussion of papers. Each student should be prepared to speak for a few minutes outlining the major points and conclusions from his or her final paper.

Session 28 –Wrap up discussion (each student should be able to articulate a few sentences about what was the most important thing they learned about antisemitism, and what surprised them) with refreshments.
